Target BERLIN. May 7, 1944.

After a long rest, due to bad weather, we got Big B again. 3-1000 lb bombs and 5-500 lb incendiaries. They really laid down a flak barrage today. The sky was solid black with it but our group did not lose a ship. The weather kept the enemy fighters down. But the flak made up for them. Berlin sure is a wreck and I never saw as many airplanes in one place in my life. Time 9 hours.

VII. 7

May 8, 1944. Sottervost France.

Hit rocket installation with 3-1600 lb full armor piercing bombs. They used tracking flak and got one of our B 17s. Group ahead of us was shot to pieces. This place has the most accurate flak in the world, according to the older boys. No fighters. Time 4 hrs 30 minutes.

VIII. 8

May 11, 1944. Trier Germany.

Target was rail road marshalling yard. We really wiped it out. Took 6-1000 lbers. We evaded the flak but were hit directly by Me 109s. They got three of our B 17s. Lt. Ace Hammerger got it above us and Johnny Stift our ball turret gunner probably got the Me 109 that got him. It went down smoking into the clouds. They also hit us from underneath, gunner held them off. Boy those fighters scare hell out of me. Time 6 hrs.

IX. 9

May 12 1944. Merseburg Germany.

Target. Chemical works. We carried 36-100 lb demolition bombs and really wiped it out. Saw rockets fired at us from the ground for the first time. Sky black with flak, boy they must have a lot of guns down there. Saw one enemy fighter, however we had P 38s & P 47s for escort. Time 8 hrs and 30 minutes.

May 13, 1944. Stettin Germany.

Target was Naval Experimental Station. Not much flak but we were really hit by fighters regardless of our escort. Me 109s got three B 17s right next to us. They showered us with 20 mm cannon shells. Boy these German fighters arn't afraid of any thing, bowled right through our formation but we really threw the lead at them. Saw 5- P 51s tackle 35-109s and a helluva dog fight. Am dead tired- time 10 hrs and 35 minutes. Boy I will never forget this one Me 109s got three B 17s right next to us.

Letters did not get us out there alone. There 9 hours. Any minute. The crew was as brave as any 8 men could ever be. It is a lesson the really you will make it. Carried 10 -500 lb bombs. Very little bad flak and the fighters hit groups on both side of us but never made a pass at us. Tight formation really has its merits. Best bombing formation I have ever seen all of our bombs in a 1000 ft circle. Really wiped that plant out nothing left of it at all. Time 7 hrs 30 minutes.

XXXX XVI. 16

May 29, 1944. Schneidemuhl Poland.

Carried 42-100 lb incendiaries, and missed the target. We had a twenty minute running fight 7- Me 109's, shot two of them down and the did not get any of our group. No escort. We fell behind the wing doing a 960 degree turn over the target. No 2 prop ran away and so we salvoed our bombs and got back in close formation when the fighters hit us. Boy that is the scariest I have been in my life. These dam fighters are hell. That is the first time we had to fight them off alone. Our boys really poured out the 50 cal slugs. Used almost all of our ammunition sure glad the Me's ran out first. I felt like the devil anyway, have a deep chest cold, temperature and a very bad case of hay fever too. Guess I should go to the Doc, but must stick it out and get these raids over with while my nerves are still all ok. Time 10 hrs & 20 minutes, to long.

XVIII. 18

June 2 1944. Pas De Calais France.

12-500 lbs on rocket installations. Very easy mission P.F.F. no flak and no fighters could stand about 12 more like this one. Short too, 4 hrs 25 minutes.

Gattered 2-2000 lb grapefruit as we initiatied this type
of bombing for first time in U.S. Air History. We
really used the glide bombs successfully.
Plenty of black Happy Valley but we let the bombs
away 25 miles from the target and didn't get near it.
Really wonderful to see those P-38s appearing. Bombs
take off in formation for the city. Boy it was really
burning when we left. Destroyed the Cologne Cathedral
however it couldn't be helped. Time 6 hours.

Carried 18--250lb bombs and hit another airfield. Destroyed it completely. Our first mission as a squadron leader. All the boys on our wings said we did well and lead them very well. Weather was awful, we got wings full of ice going up and air speed indicator froze. Thought once we would have to bail out but luck was still with us. We came home right on the ground, we led low squadron and had to dodge church steeples and radio towers. Ceiling was 300 ft and visibility 1500 yds, with terrific rain storm. The sky was full of planes and the air discipline was more wonderful than you can imagine. That low flying is really dangerous. Time was 6 hours.

XXIV. 24

June 14, 1944.

Calemier France.

Carried 48-100 lb bombs and smashed an airfield. We lead low squadron again and didn't get to much flak. Saw flak get two B-17s in group ahead of us. The Luftwaffe was up in terrific force but hit groups behind us. Heard our friendly escort calling for help. There were more enemy fighters up than they could handle. Boy, I am glad they did not hit our group. Time 6 hrs 25 minutes.

XXV 25

June 16 1944.

Laon France.

Carried 12-500 lbs to hit an airfield. Poorly lead mission, lead bombardier made two runs and didn't bomb. Finally bombed a small rail road yard. Really a lousy mission. God must be with us we lead high and McHugh lead our low squadron. He was shot down by flak on our second run over the target. It was his 30th and last mission both ways. McHugh really put up a game fight to try and bring his crew back. He dove straight down three times to try and blow out the fire in his left wing but could'nt do it. He was flying level above the clouds and we saw four ~~num~~ chutes get out. Last we saw of him was when he went in clouds still level with left wing burned off up to # 1 engine. Every one was shot up by flak we only had five holes however. Boy we are really sweating now. 6 hrs 25 minutes.
