SUBJECT: Comments of Crews Participating in Mission to ALEN, GERMANY,
23 March 1944.

TO : COMMANDING OFFICER, Station 128, APO 557, U. S. Army. (Thru
Lt. Col. B. K. Voorhees and Lt. Col. A. C. Brooks.)

1. Lt. Byrd, Pilot, A/C 496: "most of crew had gas pains as a result of the breakfast". Gunners want P-51's to act more like friendly fighters. P-51's were observed to queue up at 10 o'clock.

2. Lt. Taylor, Navigator, A/C 069 suggests a piece of cloth on flak suit to which oxygen hose could be attached.

3. Lt. Livingstone's crew state that mission was excellent from the standpoint of navigation and bomb load.

4. Lt. C.L. Wilson's crew said they had too long a wait for transportation after landing.

5. Lt. Cummings, A/C 904: "flight plan way off, 20 minutes ahead of time at point 3".

6. Lt. Hirsch, A/C 521: "not briefed on a secondary target".

7. Lt. Shaw, A/C 847 thinks formation flown too fast and let-down too fast.

8. S/Sgt. Sellitto, A/C 662: "formation of low squadron was poor, breakfast was poor too".

9. Lt. Jeffery, A/C 891: "mission was well led, good evasive action". All crew members state that they were second to land but last to get transportation.

10. Capt. Maupin, A/C 511 stated that regardless of route and turns near target area, a definite point along route should be designated for the boxes within wing to take interval. Today uncovering was done much too soon resulting in wing formation being broken up and vulnerable for too long a period.

SUBJECT: Target Conversation over VHF.

TO : Commanding General, 1st Bombardment Division, APO 567, U.S. Army.
(Attention: A-2).

1. Interrogation on the mission of 23 March 1944 regarding whether or not there was target information divulged over VHF resulted as follows:

a. Lt. Gattis, 614th Squadron, overheard a navigator telling someone they were over the IP. No target name was mentioned.

b. Lt. Coyne, 612th Squadron, heard someone say "beautiful target over here" and then spelled out a five letter word which was not distinguishable.

c. Lt. Hershey, 612th Squadron, heard someone give a heading of 135° to a pilot.

d. Lt. Maloney, 615th Squadron, heard name PT over VHF in vicinity of IP "are we still going to bomb Gutersloh?". Someone didn't release bombs and went to secondary. Think the VHF statement came from this Group.

2. No other information regarding route or destination was heard.

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Briefing Notes

1. Today's target is an airfield and airpark. For the past two years it has been a supply center and airpark (which is comparable to our sub-depot set-up) for the forwarding of important types of fighter aircraft.

Division advises that this target is a high priority target. It is very possible that the noticeable lack of the G.A.F. recently has been due to the successful bombing in the past of this type of target and certainly, at a time like this, any such installation that is knocked out will seriously hamper the G/A/F in the future.

1. Major Edwin W Brown, who led the 94th Combat Wing, praised the effectiveness of the friendly fighter escort; his opinion was shared by all airplane commanders and crew members.
2. Lt Warren Gulula (navigator) A/C 1087, stated that the mission was well planned and excellently run from the standpoint of navigation; this comment was seconded by Lt Kenneth C Wells (Pilot) A/C 1087.
3. Lt Donald E Jones (Pilot) A/C 1508, commented that the leader of the 94th Combat Wing did a very excellent job.
4. Lt Benjamin H Johnson, Jr (Pilot) A/C 9943, commented that some interrogators appear to be in a hurry and don't pay enough attention to crew members' observations; he felt that making light of what crew members report by way of observations would have the tendency to defeat efforts to encourage observations.
5. Adverse criticism of the breakfast served by the combat mess, particularly the sausages, was made by the following: Lt Edward T O'Neil (Copilot) A/C 1508, the crew of Lt Robert O Stine (Pilot) A/C 9847, the crew of Stuart E Smith (Pilot) A/C 0050 and the crew of Lt Gaston E Fox (Pilot) A/C 1891.
6. T/Sgt Nicholas D Schoenberger (ROG) A/C 1508 stated that handling chaff and taking pictures gives the ROG too much to do at one time.
7. Lt Robert F Schleiper (Navigator) A/C 2005 thinks flashlights should be issued to crew.
8. Lt Victor S Reese (Navigator) A/C 0050 shared the opinion of Lt Gulula, item #2 above, concerning navigation.

1. Several crew members report top turret gunner in lead A/C fired at P-51 escort. Major Edwin W Brown, who lead the 94th Combat Wing, stated that tactics employed by one ship of this escort very much resembled those of a German single engine fighter, inasmuch as the P-51 pointed his nose at the formation and came in very close.

2. Lt George R Van Dyke (Navigator) A/C 9993 stated that chaff discharged by Combat Wing which preceded the 94th Combat Wing over the target was apparently very effective in deflecting fire put up by flak installations; a large number of flak bursts in the Schweinfurt area were concentrated to the south and east of the attacking force, at an altitude several thousand feet lower than that at which the formation was flying.
