SUBJECT: Leader's Narrative, Mission of 29 May 1944.

TO : Commanding Officer, 401st Bomb Group, APO 557.

1. The 401st flew high box for the 94th Combat Wing, 351st was lead and the 457th was low. Assembly over Deenethorpe was very good. The route over England was as briefed and the control points made good.

2. The course to the target was as briefed except in the vicinity of Bremen, where the track was about ten miles North of the briefed course. The remainder of the course was as briefed with excellent timing.

3. The high box uncovered at the I.P. and bombed third with good results. After bombing a sharp turn was made and the group rejoined the Wing.

4. Both Group and Wing formation was excellent throughout.

5. Enemy fighters were encountered about five minutes after the target and were in the vicinity of the 94th Wing for about thirty minutes. One FW190 made an attack, but all other fighters attacked the Wing to the right of the 94th or were driven off by friendly escort. Fighter escort was fair to poor.

6. Meager flak was encountered near Quakenbruck, at the target and at landfall on the Baltic side of the German Peninsula.

7. All aircraft returned to England, one landing at another base for fuel. The group received moderate damage due to flak.

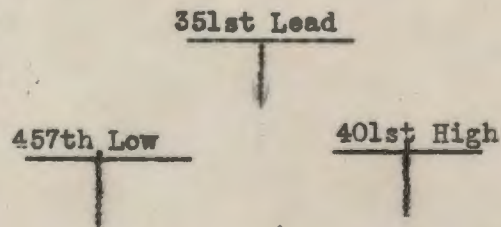

SUBJECT: Lead Bombardiers Narrative

TO : Commanding Officer, 401st Bombardment Gp(H)
APO 557, U.S.Army.

1. BOMBING APPROACH AND RUN: The 401st Group was flying the High Box of the 94th Combat Wing., attacking Sorau, Germany. We uncovered at the I.P. being the third group in the wing to bomb. The target was easily picked up due to excellent visibility. We made an S turn to the right in order to slightly increase our distance and better space ourselves behind the preceeding group. The heading on the bomb run was 81°. The M.P.I. was identified and the synchronization was excellent.

2. The strike covered the M.P.I. thoroughly but due to the fact that the Low Squadron was out of position to the left and rear some of the bombs fell short and to the left hitting the airfield proper.

3. Bombs were away at 12:58.

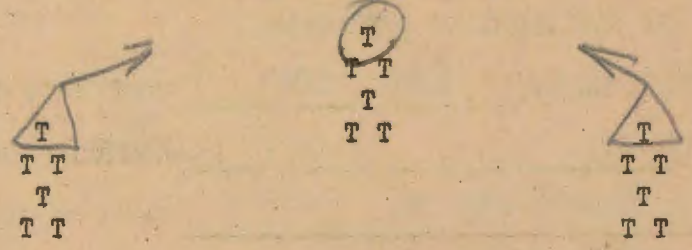

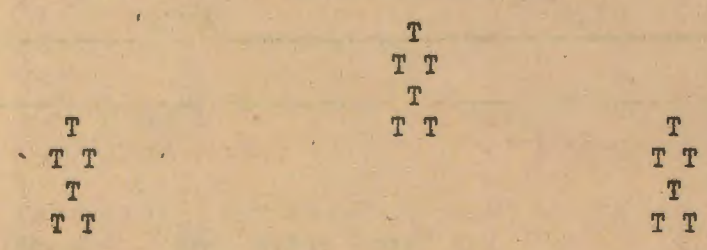

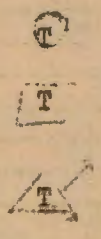
COMPOSITE GROUPS

Bombardier dropping on leader, with arrow indicating leader's position.

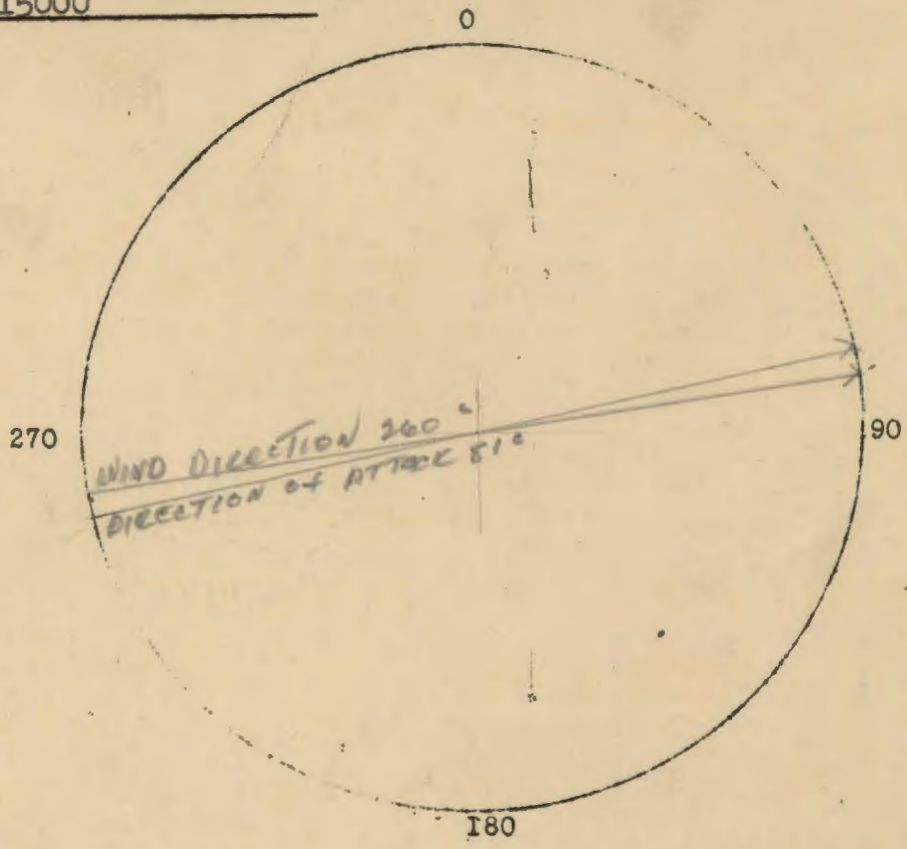


MBARDIER'S INDIVIDUAL PLOT

SUBJECT: Enemy Opposition and Tactical Analysis Report on the Mission
to SCRAU, GERMANY 29 May 1944.

TO : COMMANDING GENERAL, 1st Bombardment Division, APO 557, U. S. Army.
(Attention: A-2).

1. Between 25 to 40 E/A consisting of ME 410's, FW 190's and ME 109's were observed between target and Stettin but were kept at a distance by our fighter escort. Several individual passes were made at our formation from low to level at between 3 o'clock to 5 o'clock positions but E/A were immediately chased by fighters.

2. Several crews observed an encounter in which a single P-51 destroyed 4 ME 410's. The action took place at 1329 at approximately 5300 N - 1548 E where 4 ME 410's were queued up to attack our Group. The P-51 attacked from low and behind, shooting down 2 E/A on first pass. Then made 360° turn and destroyed third ME 410 at about 10,000 ft., the ME 410 having immediately dived at first attack. Three pilots bailed out and the E/A were observed to burn on the ground. The fourth ME 410 was reported destroyed shortly afterwards near the ground.

SUBJECT: Crew Comments and Suggestions.

TO : COMMANDING OFFICER, 401st Bombardment Group (H), APO 557, (Thru
Lt. Col. B. H. Voorhees and Lt. Col. A. C. Brooks.)

1. Several crews observed an encounter in which a single P-51 destroyed 4 ME 410's. The action took place at 1329 at approximately 5300 W - 1540 N where 4 ME 410's were queued up to attack our Group. The P-51 attacked from low and behind, shooting down 2 E/A on the first pass. Then made 360° turn and destroyed third ME 410 at about 10,000 ft., the ME 410 having immediately dived at first attack. Three pilots bailed out and the E/A were observed to burn on the ground. The fourth ME 410 was reported destroyed shortly afterwards near the ground.

2. Major Ralph J. White, Group Leader, commented that the 351st Group led the 94th CGV in an excellent manner. This comment was seconded by several crew members.

3. Lt. Ray F. Whitney, navigator for Major White, complimented the Lead Navigator for the Wing. Other navigators were of the same opinion.

4. Lt. William W. Trimble, pilot A/C 7981, stated that 401st Group formation was very good and was well led today. Several other airplane commanders made the same observations.

5. Lt. George P. Bingham and Lt. Richard H. Hoyt, pilot and co-pilot of A/C 9993, stated that the Leader of the Low Squadron flew the smoothest formation they have yet experienced.

6. Lt. George P. Bingham, pilot A/C 9993, observed that P-38 fighter escort salvaged their gas tanks much too close to the formation.

7. Lt. Clinton J. Parr, pilot A/C 7113, severely criticized the fact that his enlisted men were scheduled for a tour of guard duty right after they returned from the mission. Other Officers and enlisted have the same criticism.

8. Lt. Warren Celula, navigator A/C 1072, observed that the top turret of A/C 811 was empty and did not move for seventy-five minutes, the TTD apparently having left his position while the formation was still 140 miles from the English Coast.

9. Capt. Scribner C. Dailey, pilot A/C 2780, observed that someone put a .50 Caliber bullet through one of his propellers.

BRIEFING NOTES

Your target is a previously briefed target but not a previously bombed one by us. It is the fighter A/C and Assembly factory of the Focke-Wulf Co., which is the largest of the F-W Assembly factories-one of these is to be attacked by the 2nd Div.

Components are drawn from the neighboring town where factories are located, and from two additional factories which are indicated on the map.

The assembly factory has been operating since mid-1943, and although it has had operational difficulties, its production should have been expanded considerably.

This plant, regarded as the largest remaining source of FW 190's, was not hit during the attack on 11 April '44, due to poor weather and visibility. Damage was done however to former textile plants in the city now associated with the assembly factory, and severe damage to six most probable component plants was observed from strike photos.

Your MPI is a point in the assembly hangars, which is the primary vital point in this target.

YOUR SECONDARY TARGET is the experimental station, a base used for many purposes, the chief of which is the production of high-concentration of hydrogen-peroxide. The MPI selected is the quarters located on S.E. corner of the target.

LAST RESORT TARGET is any military objective in Germany or any A/D not near built up areas which may be bombed without disrupting fighter support.

STATEMENT OF MAJOR RALPH J. WHITE, GROUP LEADER.

31 May 1944

I was leader of the 401st Bombardment Group (H) in the 94th Combat Bombardment Wing (H) of the 1st Bombardment Division (H) on the mission of 29 May 1944 to Sorau, Germany. I flew as Pilot in A/C 1485.

After we had bombed the target, a Focke-Wulf assembly plant at Sorau, Southeast of Berlin, we proceeded Northerly toward the Baltic Sea, at an altitude of 15,000 feet. Friendly escorting fighters were in the vicinity and were able to engage most of the enemy aircraft we observed, at a distance from our formation.

At 1329 hours, in the vicinity of Woldenberg, Germany (my Navigator logged the spot as 5300 N - 1548 E) four (4) ME-410's appeared, flying parallel to our formation and in the same direction, at a speed I estimated at 200 MPH. They were approximately 1500 yards away, flying echeloned to the left and were looking us over. We had been watching them come up and at first I had thought they were Bf-109's because of their perfect formation. At that particular time, there were no friendly escorting fighters around and I expected them to start lobbing rockets into our Group formation.

Approximately 20 seconds before the ME-410's were parallel to us, I observed a single P-51 Mustang fighter coming up on the ME-410's from slightly below and to their rear. He seemed to be throttled back and was not observed by the ME 410's who were intent upon our formation. When the P-51 was still slightly below the 410's and within 100 to 150 yards behind them, he started firing. I could see the bullets hit the planes.

The rear ME-410 burst immediately into flames and one chute came out. The other three started a diving turn to the right. They had turned scarcely as much as ten degrees before the P-51 got the second one, which burst into flame and one chute came out.

By this time, the other two were diving very steeply, still in echelon. They had lost about 3000 feet altitude when the third 410 was hit and my Ball Turrett Gunner reported on interphone that the third chute came out.

The P-51 by then was right after the remaining 410 and got him on what seemed to me to be a deflection shot. I could see the bullets striking his wing. He crashed by a lake, no opportunity to bale out.

I later saw the wreckage of all four of these planes burning on the ground.

STATEMENT OF CAPT. SCRIBNER C. DAILEY, DEPUTY GROUP LEADER.

31 May 1944

I was Deputy Group Leader of the 401st Bombardment Group (H) on the mission of 29 May, 1944 to Sorau, Germany. I flew as pilot of A/C No. 2780.

After we had bombed the target, a Focke-Wulf Assembly plant at Sorau, Southeast of Berlin, we proceeded Northerly toward the Baltic Sea, at an altitude of 15,000 feet. Friendly escorting fighters were in the vicinity and were able to engage most of the enemy aircraft we observed, at a distance from our formation.

At 1329 hours, in the vicinity of Woldenberg, Germany (location approximately 5300 N - 1548 E), four ME-410's came up, flying parallel with our formation and in the same direction, approximately 1500 yards away and flying slowly, intent upon our formation. They were flying in echelon to the left. There were no friendly escorting fighters in the area at that particular time, and when they were just about abreast of us, I saw flames from the wings of two of the 410's. I thought that they had launched rockets at us and so stated into the interphone. ~~xxxxx~~ Then ~~that~~ I saw the first 'chute come out, and it was at that instant that I first observed the P-51 behind them.

The remaining three 410's went into a steep dive to the right, headed under our formation. I never saw such an exhibition in my life, because the P-51 had shot down three of the 410's before a full five seconds time had elapsed. I saw the three chutes from these three planes.

The fourth and remaining 410, which ~~had gone into~~ was diving ~~xxxxx~~ almost vertically, to the right, and was by then headed about 180 degrees from our course, was down to 8000 feet altitude when the P-51 caught him. I saw the bullets strike and he crashed into the ground, no parachute coming out. the wreckage of

STATEMENT OF CAPTAIN WAYMAN T. HUTSON, DEPUTY LEAD BOMBARDIER.

31 May 1944

I flew as Bombardier for Captain Scribner C. Dailey, Deputy Group Leader of the 401st Bombardment Group (H) on the mission of 29 May 1944 to Sorau, Germany.

After we had bombed the target, a Focke-Wulf Assembly plant at Sorau, Southeast of Berlin, we were proceeding Northerly toward the Baltic Sea, at an altitude of 15,000 feet. Friendly escorting fighters were in the vicinity and were able to engage most of the enemy aircraft we observed, at a distance from our formation.

At 1329 hours, in the vicinity of Wolbenberg, Germany (5300 N - 1548 E), I observed four ME-410's, flying parallel to and in the same direction as our formation, out approximately 1500 yards and echeloned to the left. I saw the flame from the wing of the rear 410 and immediately observed the P-51, which was about 150 yards behind the ~~enemy~~ four enemy aircraft. Almost at once, the 1st chute came out of this 410.

Very shortly afterward, another chute came out of the second 410. I could see the bullets hitting the plane.

The remaining two 410's were going down steeply in a dive to the right, with the P-51 right after them. He got the one on the left and I saw a chute come out.

By this time, the remaining 410 had turned sharply to the right, still in a steep dive. The P-51 turned inside him, let him have it, and I saw him crash into the ground, no chute appearing beforehand.
