SYMOPSIS: The above named casualties are reported on OMG Forms
371 as missing in action over Vegesack, Germany, on the date cited above.

No Missing Air Crew Report indicates that subject casualties comprized the sentire crew of aircraft B-24H, #42-7470, which failed to return from a bombing mission to Vegesack. A notation made part of subject report indicate the aircraft was seen to explode as the result of enemy gunfire.

A memorandum for Record, dated 6 April 1949, reveals that subject. asrcraft was one (1) of tiree (3) B-24 type bombers lost from a force of fifty five (55) which bombed Vegesack on 8 October 1943, in conjunction with

the bombing of Bremen, Germany, with a force of three hundred forty-four (344) B-17's. Further, of three hundred and five (305) airmen lost on these raids; all have been accounted for except the ten (10) concerned herein.

Dulag records, according to the above Menorandum, reports the crashes of two (2) B-24 type aircraft on the date cited; both within a 30-40 mile radius of Bremen, Germany. There was no identifiable report for the third aircraft. unless consideration be given that reported in Dulag records as shot down of the coast of Holland. The paragraph in the Memorandum concerning this record is quoted in full, as follows: "Only one German reference (KU 210) is found to a bomber downed that day, 'fate of crew unknown'. This stated that an' American Fortress (German records often failed to distinguish properly between our B-17 and B-24 types) was shot down off the coast of Holland at 1633 hours With regards to the possibility that the above Dulag reference does concern the aircraft in question, the Memorandum concludes: "The Bremen-Vegesack area was highly developped, well populated, and vitally important to the enemy swar effort. Surrounding waters were under his control and undoubtedly well patrolled by surface craft as well as planes. That any Allied aircraft could fall in this area during a period of good, visibility without being sighted and reported to the High Command seems highly improbable. Since all other aircraft lost over the target (Buemen-Vegesack) on 8 October 1943 have been accounted for, it seems most likely, if not indisputable, that the "Fortress" reported in German Record "KU 210" as having been shot down off the coast of Holland, fate of crew unknown was manied by the personnel named in paragraph 1. above (the ten crew members concerned)."

Lt. William P. Nicholson an eyewitness to the incident whose name appears on the reverse side of the HACP, furnishes additional information which indicates that the aircraft piloted by Lt. Buschman was seen to explode rather than the aircraft concerned herein. Pertinent parts of his replies to letters of inquiry are extracted from the Memorandum, as follows: "ACCOMENT TO BE AND THE PLANE OF THE PROPERTY OF THE

Whereas findings thus far presented imply that the entire crew perished when their aircraft crashed at an undetermined location in the North Seas at telegram and a letter received from unknown sources by the brother of one (I crew member S/Sgt-Dominick F. Cavell; indicates that S/Sgt-Gavell was not

killed in the aircraft crash. The brother, Mr. Frank P. Cavell, writes in regards to the telegram received in November 1943, "The telegram simply stated that my brother, S/Sgt D. F. Cavell, was a prisoner in enemy hands. It was signed 'Isreal'. Mr. Cavell also furnished a photostatic copy of the letter, dated 18 February 1944, which reads: "Your son F. Cavell is safe, in good place, in good health, and in good care. On his first opportunity he will communicate with you. Love to all also to Miss Robert. Keep this secret from suspicious people, He is not a prisoner of Germany."

A Field Investigation conducted at Vegesack on 4 September 1947 revealed that no aircraft crashed in the area of Vegesack or in communal areas under its jurisdiction. Officials had no knowledge of the casualty, S/Sgt Cavell.

All attempts by this Headquarters to associate subject casualty with remains of unknown deceased proved negative.

From facts herein presented and in the absence of any factual evidence as to the survival of subject casualties after the incident, other than that on record for S/Sgt Cavell, it is concluded that:

- a. Nine (9) of the above named crew members were killed or died from exposure when their aircraft crashed into the North Sea at an undetermined location and their remains have never washed ashore, procluding their recover
- b. S/Sgt Cavell survived the crash, was captured, rescued by the "underground" resistance movement and later met his death in an unknown manner which precludes attempts toward investigation and recovery of his remains.

NARRATIVE REPORT

On 27 August 1947 I was dispatched by this Headquarters to Begesack, Germany (L-54/R-50) to investigate AGRC case # 8800 pertaining to S/Sgt Dominick F. Cavel and nine (9) crew members of same aircraft still in a casual ty status. According to basic document the a/c # 42-7470 of which S/Sgt Cavel was a crew member failed to return from a bombing mission over Vegesack on 8 October 1943. Operational Instructions #48 state that plane was last significant the vicinity of Bremervoerde, Germany.

- I first went to Vegesack and questioned the local officials. They stated (see incl. "1 and 2) that in the communities of Vegesack, and nearby localities of Schoeneback, Aumund and Grohn only one (1) grave of David Turpin 35210467 is known. His name does not correspond with names mentioned in inclosed MACR # 87%. The case of Turpin is being investigated separately.
- 2. I then went to Bremervoorde, where plane was reported to have been last sighted. I questioned the local officials and I was informed (see incl. #3) that no plane crashed in that locality in October 1943.
- 3. I have also checked records and found (see incl. #4) that no casualties of the whole area correspond by name or date of death with deceased in question.

CONCLUSION:

Investigation in the area of Vegesack where a B-24H # 42-7470 had a bombing mission as well as the area of Bremervoerde, in the vicinity of which a/c was last sighted fail to reveal a casualty corresponding with S/Sgt Dominick F: Cavel.

RECOLLENDATION:

It is recommended that case be considered negative.


MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: Review of Circumstances Surrounding the Disappearance of Personnel Presumed Dead

1. The following members of the 392nd Bombardment Group, Air Corps, were reported missing in action over Vegasack, Germany, on 8 October 1943, while in flying pay status:

- 2. Following their continued absence for a year, the above named personnel, with the exception of Sergeant Cavell (See par 3 e, below) were presumed dead on 9 October 1944 (SPAD No. 1418, dated 9 Oct 44, File AG 704 Dead), in accordance with the provisions of Section 5 of the Missing Persons Act, as amended. A Finding of Death was issued on 14 August 1945 in the case of Sergeant Cavell (SRAD No. 1418-A), who had been continued in a missing in action status on 9 October 1944.
- 3. The following information was presented in the determination referred to above:
 - a. Missing Air Crew Report No. 879, dated 10 October 1943, now filed in the Memorial Division, OQNG, shows that the ten officers and enlisted men named above constituted the entire crew aboard a B-24H type aircraft, No. 42-7470, the "Exterminator", lost on a bombing mission over Vegasack, Germany, on 8 October 1943, due to enemy aircraft action. Their crew positions, in the order in which they are named above, were listed as: pilot, navigator, co-pilot, bombardier, engineer, radio operator, assistant radio operator-gunner, assistant engineer, armorer-gunner, and gunner. The plane was reported to have exploded approximately 25 miles north-northeast of Bromen (530 25 N, 090 08 E), at 1628 hours. No parachutes were sighted. The weather was reported "Good, 8-10 visibility".



- b. Copies of letters from the Air Adjutant General to families of the missing crew, dated 8 May 1944 and filed in subjects! AG 201 files, stated that their bomber apparently had sustained damage from attacks by enemy fighters, but made no further reference to the fate of the plane.
- c. Official War Department records for 8 October 1943 showed that 344 B-17's with fighter escort attacked Bremen in 3 waves, losing 27 bombers and 3 P-47's as the result of intense antiaircraft fire and attacks of 300 enemy aircraft. Vegasack was bombed by a force of 55 B-24's an hour later, with a loss of three bombers.
- d. Casualty records showed that within a five-month period following the raids, from six to ten members of every plane crew lost had been reported recovered by the German Government as prisoners or deceased with the exception of subject crew, on whom no official report has yet been received. Of those reported, only one, a Lieutenant Heil P. Murphy, crew member of a B-17, was reported "washed ashore".
- e. Information was received from a brother of Sergeant Cavell, indicating that he possibly was alive and receiving aid from the "underground" resistance movement which existed in both France and The Netherlands. Mr. Frank P. Cavell, 32-15 204th Street, Bayside, Long Island, wrote as follows to the Commanding General, Army Air Forces on 24 September 1944:

"We received a telegram in Movember, 1943 and a letter in February 1944. Both these messages were from unknown sources.

"The telegram simply stated that my brother Staff Sergeant D.F. Cavell, 'was a prisoner in enemies hands.' It was signed 'Israal'.

The letter, photostatic copy of which is now in subject's AG 201 file, carrying only a typewritten signature, "W. Stark", and a Trenton, New Jersey, postmark dated 18 February 1944, reads as follows:

"Your Son F. Cavell is safe, in good place, in good health, and in good care. On his first opportunity he will communicate with you. Love to all also to Miss Robert. Keep this secret from suspicious people. He is not a prisoner of Germany."

- 4. The following additional information has been obtained in connection with the present review of this case:
 - a. 27 B-17 crew members on whom it was necessary to issue findings of death on 9 October 1944 (SR&D No. 1418), have since been accounted for by official reports of burial or other information establishing definitely the date, place and cause of death for each. Of the 305 airmen lost in the raids 8 October 1943, only the 10 named in paragraph 1 above remain unaccounted for.
 - b. Translations of captured German documents now on file in this office, including records of Allied plane crashes and personnel recovered from them, contain reports, identifiable by plane crew members named therein, showing the actual locations at which most of our missing aircraft crashed on 8 October 1943. In examining these records, and comparing them with our own reports concerning the loss of the three B-24's, it is noted that:
 - (1.) One 3-24, piloted by Lieutenant Michael J. Fuerst, (MACR 2444) was reported to have lost an engine over the target, and to have turned first left under the formation on the way to the north German coast. Then it returned to the right side, but was attacked by JU 88's (enemy fighters). Some of the crew were seen to bail out, as the plane, on fire, dropped out of sight over the coast. German reports show that its crew members were picked up on the north coast, near the mouth of the Veser, some 45 miles north of Bremen.
 - (2.) The other two, both from the 392nd Bombardment Group, were reported lost northeast of Bremen (as also were several B-17's that day). On one, that manned by the crew with which this review is concerned, there is no identifiable report from the enemy. The other, piloted by Lieutenant John G. Buschman (MACR Ho. 880), was last sighted, smoke coming out of tail, 12 miles northeast of Bremen at 1620 hours, being abandoned by the crew via parachute. However, statements from repatriated crew members indicate they did not know, but thought they came down 20-30 miles southwest of Bremen, whereas official German reports (KU 245) show that they landed approximately the same distance southeast of Bremen, at 1400 hours.

- (3.) Only one German reference (KU 210) is found to a bomber downed that day, "fate of crew unknown". This stated that an American Fortress (German records often failed to distinguish properly between our B-17 and B-24 types) was shot down off the coast of Holland at 1633 hours.
- c. Two eye-witnesses to the loss of subject crew and their plane were named in MACR No. 879. One, Lieutenant John E. Slowik, was killed in action on another raid on 18 March 1944. The other, Lieutenant Villiam P. Nicholson, in answering a letter of incurry from this office dated 24 November 1948, stated (in his letter of 4 Feb 49) that:

According to his own log book, the action occurred between 1400 and 1500 hours, and that when he last saw the plane, 30 miles north-northeast of Vegasack, it was going down in a left bank, No. 4 engine out and trailing smoke. He was unable to contact the pilot by radio, but is sure that neither himself nor Lt Slowik, his navigator, saw the craft explode, as he remembers talking over the mission very carefully afterwards. Intries in his log book, he states, show that they felt sure the missing crew was either in a prison camp that night, or wandering around somewhere in Germany, uncaptured. The writer himself was leading the squadron, and was unable to see the missing plane until it fell out of its normal position. slightly to the rear and below his own ship.

With regard to the other plane lost from his Group, that piloted by Lt. Buschman, he stated that his gunners, and those of other returning planes, reported it had been hit after leaving the German coast—on the way back and exploded in mid—air as it—turned toward shore.

d. A memorandum received from the Memorial Division, OQMG, (Mr. Long), dated 2 September 1948, states that there is no burial or other information of record in that office that can be associated with this case.

The Bremen-Vegasack area was highly developed, well populated, and vitally important to the enemy's war effort. Surrounding waters were under his control and undoubtedly well patrolled by surface craft as well as planes. That any Allied aircraft could fall in this area during a period of good visibility without being sighted and reported to the High Command seems highly improbable. Since all other aircraft lost over that target on 8 October 1943 have been accounted for, it seems most likely, if not indisputable, that the "Fortress" reported in German Record "KU 210" par 4b (3.), above/, as having been shot down off the coast of Holland, "fate of crew unknown", was that manned by the personnel named in paragraph 1, above. However, reports purportedly forwarded by members of the resistance movement known to have existed in ememy occupied countries, indicates that Sergeant Cavell and thus possibly others of the same crew as well - had been able to abandon the aircraft and obtain aid and refuge for a time, at least. Accordingly, it is not believed that evidence on hand in the Department of the Army at this time is sufficient to justify the issuance of reports of death for subject personnel, under the provisions of Section 9 of the Missing Persons Act.
