More about our anniversary. It's been a nice week with a number of pleasant surprises. The day before our anniversary brought a gift package from the Atens with a 'cream' soup spoon in our sterling 'Pretty.' April 17 brought a sweet letter from Mother M. with greetings and a request that I select a gift for her from her and Pop - on account of Terre Haute shelves being bare. April 18 brought a beautiful bouquet of deep red roses with the card reading "Love, Frank." They were so pretty and so very much appreciated, Frank C. and I felt as though they were directly from you (I know they would be if you could) even though I persuaded the florist to tell me they arrived by order from Philadelphia and therefore Marie.

The next day brought an anniversary letter from Pop, saying how pleased he was two years ago when you phoned to tell of our plans and of his hopes for the future.

I wrote you about our celebration of April 17 as Aunt Mac's birthday. I hope so much that you have received the letter she wrote you.

Frank C., on April 17 I also mailed your gift - another box which was filled largely with things to eat including 16 Hershey bars (collected one by one by many of your friends including the Bishops, Mrs. Bigelow girls in the office, etc.), 3 pralines
